

SAT Subject Tests

SAT Subject tests evaluate a student's skills in a variety of specific academic areas. Each test only assesses one subject yet does it thoroughly.

SAT Subject Tests Basics

- SAT Subject Tests can set your application apart when applying to selective colleges
- Each test costs \$26
- SAT Subject Tests are offered on the same day as the SAT
 - Although you do not have to take them at the same time
- You can take one, two, or three SAT Subject Tests on one day
- There are 20 total SAT Subject Tests in five general subject areas (English, History, Languages, Mathematics, and Sciences)
 - [Here](#) is a full list of all subject tests
 - Some subject tests might not be available in certain regions
- Each test is composed of multiple choice questions taken over one hour
- Each test is scored on a 200-800 scale

Registering for SAT Subject Tests

 - While registering, upload a photo to verify your identity.
 - Make sure you choose the right test in the right location
- Pay testing registration fee
 - Fee Assistance
 - Students who qualify for free and reduced lunch can talk to their guidance counselor about obtaining a fee waiver
 - When registering for your exam, enter the 12-digit code on the fee assistance card that you will receive if you qualify
 - You can receive 3 fee waivers for SAT Subject Tests
- Print your admissions ticket to show at the testing center.

Accomodations

- Accommodations must be approved by the College Board's [Services for Students with Disabilities](#)
- Accommodations take approximately seven weeks to get approved, so start the process early!
- Work with your school to submit a request for accommodations
- After being approved, enter the SSD number found on your eligibility letter when registering for your exam
